Friends and Members of Columbus Landmarks,


We again arrive at our annual meeting with good news of an expanding membership and growing visibility and impact on central Ohio. The Preservation Awards program in November was a big success with a 25-year retrospective of the James B. Recchie Design Award and the naming of two awards in honor of esteemed founders, Henry Hunker and Paul Young. For our 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary City Hop, we added a re-invented “pre-Hop” dinner in occupied homes in the downtown to rave reviews and substantial returns.

Our fundraising efforts exceeded expectations from a record breaking year-end campaign to successfully matching the National Trust’s Partners in the Field challenge grant with new money from United Way of Central Ohio, The Columbus Foundation and private donors. These grants have allowed us to hire a part-time Field Representative, Amy Minnick, to administer the new program, under the guidance of our Preservation Services Committee. Amy will share highlights of her work with us this evening. As beneficiaries of a generous bequest from Dixie Sayre Miller, a charter member and long-time supporter of preservation, we look forward to launching an endowment campaign that will nourish Landmarks into the future. Our Finance and Development Committees have been expanded, providing astute advisement and oversight.

After many years of involvement and support from our Advocacy Committee, the stabilization of the Deardurff House in Franklinton - the oldest, in situ, log house in the county – appears imminent. This effort was aided by City Council’s approval this week to appropriate partial funding and to enter into a preservation easement agreement with the owner. Members and friends have been enjoying our ever expanding and creative neighborhood walking tours under the leadership of an exceptional Education Committee while our Communications Committee keeps us all on track with our message and brand. The effort expended by the City Hop Communications team last June was extraordinary and key to its success. And finally, we have a new three year strategic plan well underway and look for completion in the very near future.

As I step down from three years as your president, I look backward with pride at our successes and look forward as we build on those accomplishments to make the organization more sound, more effective and sustainable. I thank all of the board members and staff with whom I have had the pleasure to serve and look forward to a continued roll in our growing outreach and influence in central Ohio. I thank each of you for your commitment to Columbus Landmarks, for without your many ways of contributing we could not succeed.

### Membership

Landmarks increased its number of active memberships from 601 in 2009 to 670 in 2010. Columbus Landmarks collaborated with the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the Kelton House Museum and Garden to reach out to preservation-oriented individuals in the community netting 35 new members. Two lapsed member campaigns netted impressive returns. Members continue to receive benefits,

including discounts on educational tours and events, the *Cornerstone* newsletter and electronic mailings which keep members informed on issues related to preservation in the Columbus community.

### Education

"Educate to appreciate" is the mission of the Education Committee. In the past year, the Education Committee has conducted over 20 walking tours of Columbus neighborhoods—from Sessions Village to Milo Grogan; Italian Village to Old North Columbus; Franklinton to Worthington; Hungarian Village to Merion Village, Marble Cliff to Rush Creek, and many more. The tours started with neighborhoods where the architectural roots date from the late 18<sup>th</sup> century through the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, proving the theme of the series—"It takes many villages to raise a city 197 years old." October saw the traditional tours which blend gargoyles and gables. *Two Illuminated Spaces: Sacred Places* tours featured ecclesiastical churches and synagogues on Columbus's east side, telling the story of the congregations through their architecture and stained glass windows. Green Lawn Cemetery tours continue to be featured in spring and fall. This winter, a new venture—Historic Tavern Tours—featured three of the city's oldest "liquid assets" in the downtown—the Jury Room, Elevator Brew Pub (the Bott Brothers/Clock), and the Ringside—with plans for showcasing nine others.

The Education Committee is comprised of over 20 committed and creative folk who deeply care about how children and adults, millennials and boomers (and all generations in between), the native-born and the recently-arrived will care for the architecture and fabric of the city, and the stories which they represent.

### Communications

Communications continues to be an important way for Columbus Landmarks Foundation to inform, educate and gather support for our programs and mission, and to engage with our membership and the central Ohio community. The Communications Committee has worked with staff and other committees to significantly raise visibility and awareness through traditional media coverage and new media outreach.

*Cornerstone* newsletter is published in print form, but electronic communications has become a timely and efficient way to communicate with members as well as our database of people who have expressed interest in

historic preservation, participated in a program or requested information. Email notifications about advocacy issues and programs such as City Hop and walking tours have been well received and effective.

A great deal of effort continues to be put into improving our website: [www.columbuslandmarks.org](http://www.columbuslandmarks.org). In addition to more information being accessible from the home page and new links to social media sites, we can take reservations and payment through the site, which saves time and makes it easier to become a member or register for a tour or event. Our investment in improving the site also allows us to update in-house and send electronic notifications, which will result in significant cost-savings over time.

Columbus Landmarks secured a record number of media placements for City Hop and our other events and activities in 2009. In addition to promotion, these media placements reinforce our credibility and reputation within our community by providing our point of view and presenting our staff and board members as experts. We continue to use social media as an efficient way to reach targeted and new audiences, with blogger outreach and presence on Twitter, Facebook, YouTube and Flickr.

### **Development**

In 2009 we continued to expand our fundraising efforts, through private foundation and government grant applications, and broader corporate and individual donor requests. Most significant was our award of the United Way of Central Ohio's three-year grant to match the National Trust's Partners-in-the-Field challenge grant. The United Way grant combined with the previously announced award from The Columbus Foundation and two individual donor gifts of \$10,000 over the three-year period satisfied our obligations for match, securing the Field Representative position into 2012.

We were also awarded grants from the Certified Local Government Program of the Ohio Historic Preservation Office (by way of the City of Columbus) for the preparation of a National Register of Historic Places nomination for the Old North Columbus Commercial District, and a planning grant from the Ohio Humanities Council (OHC) for advance work on a script for a documentary on the LeVeque Tower. This was followed by the exciting recent announcement of a major media

grant from OHC to produce the documentary in 2010-2011. Unexpectedly, we also received a generous bequest from the Dixie Sayre Miller estate, providing us with the basis for an endowment campaign and incentive to expand our planned giving program.

For 2010, the board has challenged itself to raise more dollars on a multiple-year path toward increasing our bottom line for operations and staff support. The committee hopes you will consider supporting these ambitious goals, through increasing your membership support, your Annual Fund donations and your remembering Columbus Landmarks Foundation in your estate planning, as Dixie so profoundly set the example.

### **City Hop**

Last year, more than 1,100 individuals attended City Hop, and in spite of a troubled economy, the event was very successful. This year's 11th Annual City Hop will be held on Saturday, June 12 and features "the downtown way of life." The self-guided walking tour will wind through several premier downtown buildings showcasing lived-in units, as well as condominiums and apartments for sale and rent. The kick-off event will be held on Friday, June 11 and will consist of progressive dinner parties in downtown condominium buildings as well as a rooftop after-hours party.

### **James B. Recchie Design & Preservation Awards**

Every year, Landmarks honors individuals and institutions that have made exceptional strides in promoting historic preservation and producing quality urban design in central Ohio. This year marked the 25<sup>th</sup> year for the James B. Recchie Design Award. The 2009 Awards Program was held at the Broad Street Presbyterian Church. Save the date for the 2010 Design & Preservation Awards to be held **October 14 at OSU's Thompson Library**.

**The 2009 James B. Recchie Design Award** was awarded to **The William Oxley Thompson Library Renovation and Expansion**, Architects: Acock Associates, LLC, Gund Partnership and MSI Design. **The four other finalists** for this award were **The Buggyworks, Phase 1**, Architects: WSA Studio and MSI Design; **Grange Insurance Audubon Center**, Architects: DesignGroup and Kinzelman Kline Gossman; **Huntington Park Stadium**, Architects: 360 Architecture and MSI; and **The Lincoln Theatre**, Architect: Hardlines Design Co.

### **Advocacy**

The Advocacy Committee continued to follow up on preservation issues with The Ohio State University, strive for a conclusion to ongoing projects, and research new ones. Highlights include:

In spring 2009, Columbus Landmarks Foundation successfully nominated one of the Advocacy Committee’s projects (the Gunning House) for both Heritage Ohio’s “Top Opportunities” list and Preservation Ohio’s “Most Endangered” list. We also successfully nominated the Elam Drake Farm to the “Most Endangered” list and the Trautman Building to the “Top Opportunities” list. Committee members met with Heritage Ohio and Preservation Ohio representatives as they toured the sites. Unfortunately, there has been no resolution toward the preservation of any of these properties.

The year 2009 also saw progress on the preservation of the Deardurff House, the oldest log structure still on its original site in Columbus, and probably the longest-running project on the committee’s list. The City recently appropriated \$125,000 toward the project, requiring an equal or greater amount to be invested by the owner. We have also reached out to the Franklin County Commissioners about donating additional funds needed to fully restore the house in time for the 2012 Columbus Bicentennial celebrations.

In fall 2009, a local homeowners association asked us to help save the Wheeler House, a 1920s Tudor house on Olentangy River Road that was proposed for demolition in order to develop a new medical office building. The owner no longer lived in Columbus and had received an offer for the site. Landmarks testified at the hearing where the commission elected to table the project. Subsequently the house was put back on the market

and ultimately purchased by a couple who wishes to occupy the home, eliminating the threat of demolition.

Currently, the Advocacy Committee, in conjunction with the Education Committee is working on “The Living City Bus Tour,” a behind-the-scenes look at advocacy in historic preservation. The tour is scheduled for the afternoon of May 15.

### **Preservation Services**

The Preservation Services Committee significantly increased its scope and available services with the hiring of Field Representative Amy Minnick.

Partners in the Field, a program of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, brings technical preservation services, training, educational opportunities, advocacy and threat intervention assistance to local and statewide preservation organizations throughout the United States. Amy Minnick is one of 54 Partners in the Field. Landmarks has married this model program with United Way of Central Ohio's "Safe and Decent Housing" program. United Way’s initiative focuses on five "Vibrant Neighborhoods" in Columbus: Franklinton, Near Southside, Weinland Park, Northern Lights, and King/Lincoln Bronzeville. This combination of funders and programs is unprecedented. The collaboration is being viewed as a potential replicable national model in historic preservation and neighborhood revitalization. Landmarks’ unique Partner in the Field program is providing a new opportunity to demonstrate the value of historic preservation in previously underserved neighborhoods and communities. Field Representative site visits, technical guidance, and advocacy assistance are available throughout central Ohio’s neighborhoods and downtown.

Recent events included a fall workshop on Financial Incentives for Historic Properties in collaboration with Preservation Ohio and a December seminar on Sustainability and Preservation, in partnership with Half Moon seminars. Future activities include a Building Doctor Clinic in Weinland Park on May 6-7, 2010, in conjunction with the Ohio Historic Preservation Office (open to residents citywide), Home Maintenance workshops in partnership with the Franklinton Landlord/Tenant Association, a Historic Windows program during the summer of 2010, and Greening seminars throughout the city at Columbus Metropolitan Library locations.

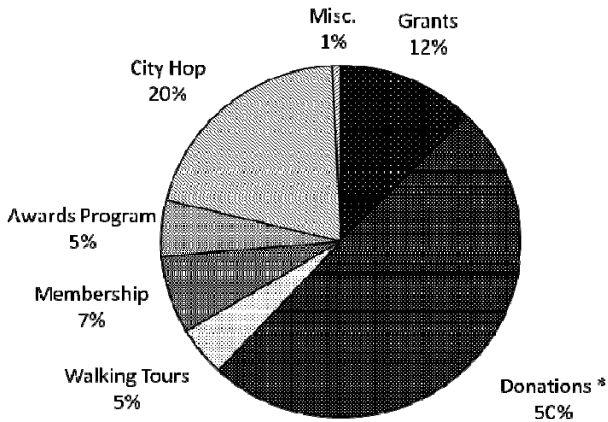
